FINANCIAL REPORT:

Sue McPhee presented the Financial report

Financial Report for Year Ended 30 June 2020

First, sincere thanks to Marg Bartlett for handing over such a tidy, comprehensive set of accounts and for her continued support. Also, thanks to our Manager, Julie, and to Roger and the outgoing Committee for being so welcoming and patient as I came to grips with the financial idiosyncrasies of this fantastic Club.

Consolidated Accounts

Financial reports are included in the AGM booklet which has been distributed to all members and loaded on the Club's website.

The Club had a consolidated surplus over all divisions of \$72.8k for the year, bringing Owners Equity to \$1,086,000.

Operating Revenue

Included in operating revenue of \$133k is \$11k, being value of the Feva Vessel, which was donated to the Club by the now disbanded Horowhenua Sailing Club. Also included in operating revenue are donations for the new floating jetty amounting to \$42.5k. Included in this is a \$17k grant from Pelorus Trust. The list of donors toward this project has been sent to all members and displayed in the Clubrooms. The Club also received donations from campers of \$2k and general donations including costs to the value \$3k from Caldow Builders who built the new ramp and walkway. Subscriptions, including joining fees, increased by \$8,300 over last year. Our membership at the end of the financial year was 772 members.

The Club closed its doors due to the Covid-19 pandemic on the 18th March and re-opened for meals under Level 2 restrictions on the 15th of May. Not only did the lockdown have a negative impact on the Kitchen and Bar, it saw the cancellation of the Club's annual Easter Fishing Competition. Over this time the Club received the Government's Covid-19 wage subsidy and wage subsidy extension, meaning staff continued to be paid during the lockdown and continuing restrictions. In total \$34.6k of this subsidy has been applied to income as at 30 June 2020.

A huge shout-out needs to go to Julie who tirelessly came up with innovative ideas to keep members engaged and get the Club back up and running over this unusual period in time.

Expenses

Because of impact of the shutdown and restricted operations, it is hard to compare this financial year to prior financial years, however, I will attempt to identify significant spending and point out the reason behind material differences.

We had a celebration this year to mark 10 years of service provided by our volunteer Bar Managers. Cost of gifts went to General Expenses. Our Club is in such a sound financial position due in part to the effort and time donated by our volunteers. Thanks.

Legal fees were incurred in the review of the Club's Fishing Tournament rules.

Cancellation of printing and posting of the bi-monthly Wind and Spray in favour of weekly emailed newsletters has reduced our printing and postage costs significantly and this fall in costs will continue as we move to more on-line communication.

Included in Repairs and Maintenance Equipment costs is an expense of \$1,700 to repair the kitchen cooktop. Clubhouse Repairs and Maintenance costs included installation of the new Bar door, a new storage cupboard downstairs and a new cleaning cupboard in the men's toilets.

Looking at the performance of the individual areas of the Club:

Bar

Profit from the Bar was \$60.8k, down \$30k from last year. Impact from the lockdown is significant, especially cancellation of Easter activities. Nevertheless, gross margin from trading of 54% is still comparable to last year's 57%. Bar Managers' licenses, which come up for payment every three years, were paid in June 2020.

Meals

Surplus from the Kitchen for the year was \$25.5k compared with \$32.6k the previous year, but still with a satisfactory gross margin from trading of 45.5% compared to 47.5% last year. Despite profit being down on last year, this year's profit is significantly higher than the two previous years of \$17.3k in 2017 and \$18.5k in 2018.

Sailing

Surplus from sailing activities was \$1,750 compared to a loss of \$1,460 last year. Sponsors of this year's regatta include Robertson Holden, Compressed Air Controls, McIntosh Farm Machinery and Cranes and Pederson & Son Builders. Thanks.

Raffles

General Club raffles showed a surplus of \$4,700 compared to \$5,100 last year. A small drop considering the impact of our shutdown.

Fishing

Due to cancellation of the Easter Fishing Tournament, the Club suffered a small loss of \$1,900 from fishing activities. Paula and Kevin worked so hard to secure sponsorship and promote the tournament, only to turn around and refund sponsors and competitors. We are holding \$2,930 in sponsorship and \$420 in entry fees in the balance sheet from this year's cancelled tournament which will be released to income for the 2021 year.

Social

We have a small deficit of \$192 at the end of the year for social activities compared to a \$62 loss last year. As pointed out before, the Social division was created to organise member functions, where most of the profit made is through bar and kitchen sales.

Pool

Pool accounts show surplus of \$1,180 compared to \$1,880 last year.

Assets

The total sum of monies held in the Club's bank accounts at the end of the year was \$224k compared to \$195k at the end of the last financial year.

Major Capital Expenditure:

- Floating Jetty - \$59.6k

- Second-hand upright freezer - \$2,000
- New chest freezer - \$1,190
- New washing machine - \$1,230
- Laptop computer for the Secretary - \$1,024

Like all clubs and not-for-profit organisations, our purpose is not to make huge profits. Our purpose is to support members in providing a venue and services for their boating, fishing and social needs and at the same time continue to be a viable and sustainable operation. I am proud to be involved with such a successful and popular Club.

The executive Committee are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report.


Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of audit opinion or assurance conclusion thereon.

1 Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

Manawatu Marine Boating Club Incorporated was incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 on 17 June 1970.

Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of the Combined Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Financial Position on a historical cost basis are followed by club, unless otherwise stated in the Specific Accounting Policies.

The information is presented in New Zealand dollars. All values are rounded to the nearest dollar.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of the Combined Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Financial Position have been applied:

(a) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised when earned.

(b) Inventories

Inventories are recognised at lower of cost and net realisable value, determined on a first-in first-out basis.

(c) Trade Receivables

Trade Receivables are recognised at estimated realisable value.

(d) Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognised at cost less aggregate depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007. In 2016, the ramp was revalued by \$100,000.

(e) Income Tax

Income tax payable on profits is not recorded in the financial statements as no income tax is required to be paid on operating surplus for sporting clubs.

(f) Goods and Services Taxation (GST)

Revenues and expenses have been recognised in the financial statements exclusive of GST. All items in the Statement of Financial Position are stated exclusive of GST except for receivables and payables which are stated inclusive of GST.

(g) Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those from previous financial statements.

REMIT 1

re Manawatu Marine Boating Club Electronic and/or Postal Voting

The Executive Committee shall have the authority to investigate and if deemed appropriate implement an electronic and/or postal voting system for the Manawatu Marine Boating Club (MMBC).

The MMBC has a membership of +/- 1,450 at present (assuming 2 members per family membership).

MEMBERSHIP SUMMARY AS AT 30 JUNE 2021 CLUB

Individual Members 154

Family Members 657

Complimentary Members (including 8 Life Members) 32

The MMBC has +/- 850 voting members (1 vote per individual membership and 1 vote per family memberships). Currently members have to be present at the meeting when the membership of the MMBC is required to vote. Historically voter turnout has been +/- 15%. As per the last 2 opportunities the membership of the MMBC has had the opportunity to vote (2020 AGM and Special General Meeting 2021). An electronic and/or postal voting system would provide for a far greater percentage of the membership to actively partake in the voting process.

In the event the Executive Committee elect to adopt an electronic and/or postal voting system for the MMBC the following would apply:

- Voting rights would remain the same as catered for in the current MMBC constitution, one vote per individual, couple and family membership.
- Only full financial members shall have voting rights
- Electronic and/or postal voting will be available for all occasions that the membership of the MMBC is required to vote
- The electronic and/or postal voting system would be available/open for up to 14 days prior to 12.01am on the day before the date of the meeting that the membership of the MMBC is required to vote.

REMIT 2

Authority for the Executive Committee to trial Summer Membership for one year

Proposer: Executive Committee

The Executive Committee has the authority to instigate a summer membership structure on trial for one year should they elect to do so.

By definition, a summer member would have all the same club privileges as a full member but for a defined period of time, not greater than 10 weeks. However, they would not be eligible to vote or hold any position on the Executive Committee.

The cost of summer membership would be determined by the Executive Committee but would be no less than 50% of a full membership fee.

If there were to be a joining fee for summer membership this would be determined by the Executive Committee.

The Rationale

The rationale for providing the Executive Committee authority to trial summer membership is because the current constitution does not allow for summer membership.

Summer membership has been discussed at an Executive level a number of times over the years. There have been mixed feelings about the pros and cons of such a concept. One of the main negative factors against introducing the summer membership has been uncertainty about the implementation of the summer membership and the question of whether it adds value for the Club and its existing members.

The Club is currently installing a new Point of Sale cash register system at both the bar and restaurant. This system will enable the Club to provide a discount to members and ensure non members do not gain Club privileges as they have in the past. The Executive Committee wants to ensure that over September and October the new system is fully implemented and if it meets the expectations the Executive may want the opportunity to trial summer membership using the new system. This remit gives the Executive authority to trial summer membership for one year, should they wish, to ascertain whether it is beneficial for the Club.

Note that if the Executive does decide to go with summer membership this year and it works well, this time next year there may be a remit for summer membership to be offered annually.

REMIT 3

Proposed by Susan McPhee seconded by Susan Hoskin.

Clause 12 (e)

Seven (7) Members of the Executive shall form a quorum.

Proposed change

Seven (7) **elected** Members of the Executive shall form a quorum.

Rationale

The Secretary and Treasurer are part of the Executive team and as such are included in a quorum count but have no voting rights (Clause 12 (g)). Definition of a quorum is:

The minimum number of members required for a group to officially conduct business and to cast votes. As the Secretary and Treasurer cannot cast votes, they should not be included in the quorum.
